

**MINUTES OF THE REVIEW MEETING OF THE STATE LEVEL MONITORING COMMITTEE ON 20 POINT PROGRAMMES HELD ON THE 24<sup>TH</sup> AUGUST, 2010 IN THE CONFERENCE ROOM, MAIN SECRETARIAT BUILDING AT 2:00 P.M.**

The list of Members and Officers who attended the Meeting is at Annexure – I.

The Meeting was chaired by the Hon'ble Chief Minister who is the Chairman of the Committee. At the outset, the Chief Minister welcomed all the Members and Officers who attended the Review Meeting on 20 Point Programmes. He then informed the House that this was a long pending Meeting which is being held after a gap of many years but emphasized that it is better to be late than never. He urged upon all concerned to put their heads together and accord due importance to this very important programme, which was initiated during the regime of late Prime Minister Indira Gandhi with the avowed objective of combating poverty, the main enemy which the country had to fight against in the post-Independence era. Keeping this basic purpose in mind, a number of steps have been initiated and many revisions which are relevant to our State have been made. Each and every department involved in the implementation of the Programme were called upon to make all-out efforts to make a success story of the intervention and to be motivated by having frequent reviews so as to make things happen, because in the absence of reviews, there is a tendency to forget the importance of the Programme and the main purpose gets derailed. He also said that, as mentioned at the outset, since this review has been held after many many years, he would like to stress, through Chief Secretary, that all the concerned departments should hold regular and frequent departmental review meetings for the effective and successful implementation of the Twenty Point Programme in the State. The Chairman then requested Shri Barkos Warjri, IAS, Additional Chief Secretary to brief the Meeting on the whole background of the Twenty Point Programme, before proceeding ahead with the prepared Agenda Items.

Shri Barkos Warjri, IAS, Additional Chief Secretary thanked the Hon'ble Chief Minister for taking the review meeting after a very long gap. He also said that the programmes which have been included in the TPP are by and large the same programmes which are now being looked into from different angles by the Government and that review meetings for these programmes have been held from time to time by the Chief Secretary and also at his level. Planning Department and Programme Implementation & Evaluation Department have also been following up on the decisions with concerned Departments. He went on to inform the Meeting that the State has made good progress in the performance of TPP. In March, 2009, Meghalaya was in the 24<sup>th</sup> position but during the year ending March, 2010 the State had jumped to the 12<sup>th</sup> position in the all India ranking and the State stood 1<sup>st</sup> amongst the North Eastern States. However, he said that in spite of this achievement, there is every likelihood that the State may go down the ladder if it does not keep up the momentum and therefore he urged all the concerned Departments to keep up the momentum and try to go climb up to

reach the top of the ladder even at the all-India level. He further stated that the 20 Point Programme had gone through various incarnations in the past wherein some schemes have been included by Govt. of India in one point or another of the 20 Point Programme while a number of schemes have simply undergone a name change.

The Chief Secretary said that the performance of the State during the year 2009-10 in bagging the 12<sup>th</sup> position in the all India ranking was a commendable achievement especially in the backdrop of our State's lackluster performance compared to other States of the country in the past. One of the reasons for this could have been late submission of the monthly progress Reports to Government of India by the implementing Departments resulting in non-entry of data/ statistics pertaining to our State in the Monthly Reports. He called upon the Officers of the concerned Departments to submit the reports in time so that performance of the State in the monthly reports is also reflected. He also directed that monitoring and review of progress of implementation of different Schemes/Programmes be taken up at regular intervals at the level of the Heads of Department, and also at the District and Block levels since similar Committees are there in District and Block levels to monitor and review the implementation and progress of the programmes on quarterly and monthly basis.

Shri.B.M. Lanong, Deputy Chief Minister, who is also the Deputy Chairman of the Committee stated that over the years, huge amount of funds have been pumped by Government of India for various developmental programmes in the State including TPP for the benefits and upliftment of the people of the State. However, implementation of Central Schemes has not been up to the mark and on several occasions, Members of the Legislative Assembly have even raised on the floor of the House issues of Central Schemes not being fully implemented in the rural areas. He felt that this is something that has to be viewed seriously and looked into by all concerned. He went on to state that the purpose of this Meeting is to see that all the Programmes under TPP are earnestly and fully implemented by all the implementing Departments and therefore it is high time that responsibility and accountability need to be placed on the Officers entrusted with the implementation of TPP, so as to ensure successful implementation of the programme. He also hoped that Review Meetings on TPP will be held more often so that we will be able to see how much we have improved in our performances.

**A Department- wise review of each item under 20 Point Programme was then taken up through Power Point Presentation and discussion and the following Observations and Action Points have emerged from the discussion:**

1. Firstly, through Power Point Presentation, the Meeting was briefed on the Constitution of the State Level Monitoring Committee at the State, District and Block levels and also on the functions and

Terms of Reference of the Committee according to which the State level Committee is expected to meet twice a year, the District level Committees, every quarter and the Block level Committee, every month, to review the progress of implementation of all Twenty Point Programmes by various Departments and to suggest remedial measures that can be taken up to improve on their implementation. The list of items under TPP, Parameters identified for ranking etc. were also presented.

**2. National Rural Employment Generation Scheme (NREGS)**– Under NREGS, employment is guaranteed for 100 days in a year to each rural household based on the Job Cards issued by the Blocks. This Scheme has been implemented in all 7 Districts of the State. Wages to the labourers is provided both in cash and in kind. The progress of the scheme during 2009-2010 both in terms of Job Cards issued and man-days was considered to be quite satisfactory. Shri R.V. Lyngdoh, MLA, raised the issue as to why in most cases, 100 days guaranteed employment has not been achieved. The C&RD Department, replied that availability of job depends upon the scheme/project and it may happen that the works can be completed in less than 100 days. The other constraints as informed by the Department are over-burden of works at the Blocks and non-submission of sufficient number of schemes/ proposals by the VEC to meet the number of man-days required.

Shri J.A. Lyngdoh, Minister I/c Social Welfare Deptt, etc. wanted clarification on whether works like construction of a Road under NREGS could be carried over into the next financial year if they could not be completed within 100 days due to insufficient Job Cards possessed by people of small villages. The Chairman replied in the affirmative and also informed the Member that under NREGS Guidelines, the same work could be allotted to adjacent villages within a radius of 5 KMs. if any village could not complete the job within 100 days.

The Chief Minister asked C&RD Department to identify the constraints in achieving the objective of the Scheme, stating that the success of the scheme depends on the commitment of the officers concerned. There should be proper co-ordination in the Blocks since Crores of Rupees have been sanctioned for the Scheme in the rural areas and that, convergence with PWD for construction of, at least, 5 KM roads under NREGS every year in each Block should be taken up by respective BDOs. PWD should prepare the plans & estimates, whereas wages component will be met from NREGS. If each Block constructs 5 KMs of black-topped Road in a year, 195 KMs of black-topped Roads would be constructed in all 39 Blocks every year. He said that, if the Scheme is implemented in a proper way, our rural areas will be transformed completely. He also directed the Department to find ways and means to support the VECs financially, as V.E.Cs are not paid, whereas, in other states which have Panchayati Raj System, VECs are being financially supported by Govt. of India.

Shri F.W. Momin, Minister C&RD, informed the Meeting that there are villages in Sohra area which have not been covered by NREGS, thus depriving the people of these villages of the benefits under the Scheme. In this regard, the Chief Minister instructed the Department to take up the matter with the concerned BDO, pertaining to identification of villages to be included under NREGS.

**Action Points:**

- (a) The Department should take all necessary steps to ensure that 100 days employment is provided to persons having job cards.
- (b) Convergence with PWD should be taken up by respective Blocks for construction of, at least, 5 Kms of black-topped road in each Block under NREGA every year. The BDOs are to identify the projects whereas PWD will prepare the Plans and estimates.
- (c) The Department should also examine the proposal for giving financial support to VECs.
- (d) The Department through the BDO, should identify villages of Sohra Area which may be included under NREGS.

3. **Swaranjanti Gram Swarozgar Yojana (SGSY)** –The objective of the Scheme is to bring assisted family above the poverty line by providing them income generating assets through a mix of bank credit and Government subsidy. The rural poor such as those with land, landless labour, educated unemployed, rural artisans and the disabled are covered under the scheme. The assisted families known as Swarozgaris can be either individuals or groups and would be selected from BPL families by a three member team consisting of Block Development Officer, Banker and Sarpanch. NGO's help may be sought in the formation and nurturing of the Self Help Groups (SHGs) as well as in the monitoring of the progress of the Swarozgaris.

The Chief Minister informed that Rs.15 crores was earmarked for each District for Special Schemes under SGSY and directed that each DRDA should submit proposal in accordance with the guidelines. Details of the Schemes should be brought to the notice of the Minister In-charge.

**Action Point:**

All DCs and DRDAs are instructed to make every effort to submit proposals so as to get maximum benefit from this Scheme.

4. **INDIRA AWAS YOJANA (IAY)** –The main aim of this scheme is to provide shelter to SC/ST and freed bonded labourers living below poverty line free of cost. Fund for the programme is shared by Central and State Government in the ratio of 90:10. 80 % of the fund is to be utilised for construction

of new houses and 20% for conversion or upgradation of unserviceable kutcha houses into pucca/semi pucca houses.

The performance on IAY during 2009-10 was poor as per G.O.I's grading and the Chief Minister urged upon the C&RD Department to earnestly see that the implementation of the scheme quickly picks up. He further instructed the Department to prepare a breakup of Handicapped Beneficiaries under IAY scheme in the next meeting. Shri R.V. Lyngdoh, expressed regret over the BPL list as in most cases, genuine poor families have not been included in the List, and was of the view that the Department should come up with a new approach for identifying the genuine poor families. In reply to Shri B. M. Lanong, Dy. C.M.'s enquiry on the gap of revision of the BPL list, the Department informed that the BPL list was last revised in 2002 and the next revision is due in 2011. The Deputy Chief Minister suggested that the same should be revised only after a gap of 3 to 4 years. The Principal Secretary, Urban Affairs Department etc. clarified that the criteria for identifying BPL list is prescribed by G.O.I and the definition of the same keep on changing from time to time. It was then decided that Programme Implementation Department should have a separate meeting with C&RD Department on the issue of BPL List.

**Action Points:**

- (a) The Department should examine the possibility of devising formulas to be adopted for identifying genuine BPL families.
- (b) The Department of Programme Implementation & Evaluation to have a separate meeting with C&RD on BPL list.
- (d) A break up showing the list of handicapped beneficiaries should be made available in the next meeting.

5. **Antyodaya Anna Yojana (A.A.Y):** Under this Scheme, 35 Kgs of Rice per month is supplied to each poorest family at the price of Rs. 3.00 P per Kg. Besides Rice, other Commodities like Wheat-Products, S.K. Oil and Levy Sugar are issued through the Govt. appointed Fair Price Shops. Shri R.V. Lyngdoh stated that there are A.A.Y. cards holder whose names did not appear in the BPL list which is quite ironic. The Commissioner & Secretary, Supply Department informed that the Deputy Commissioners have been authorized to identify the poor families who are to benefit from the Scheme. It was informed in the Meeting that the BPL list of Supply Department does not tally with that of C&RD Department. The Chief Minister stated that the anomalies in the Supply Department's BPL list could have arisen due to the identification of the number of BPL Families by the PDS dealers in their respective areas with the intention of getting more allotment under A.A.Y. As such the total numbers of BPL Families in the List of Supply Department could be higher when compared to the List prepared by C&RD Deptt. The anomaly needs to be looked into by the two Departments.

**Action Point:**

- (i) Anomalies in the BPL list under A.A.Y, should be looked into by both the Departments, so as to ensure that the poorest of the poor are not excluded from the list.
- (ii) A suitable criteria need to be formulated and adopted for selection of AAY families so as to ensure that genuine families are benefited from the Scheme.
- (iii) The list should be made available to the Food & Civil Supply by the respective Subdivisions and Blocks.

6. **Accelerated Rural Water supply Programme** - The Report presented in the meeting indicates that during 2009-2010 no achievement has been made by the Department in respects of habitation covered. The Commissioner & Secretary, P.H.E. Department clarified that no specific target has been set by the Ministry for habitation covered under NC and PC. The target of 500 Nos. is the combined target for both NC and PC habitation covered and slipped back habitation. But the Department could achieve its target only in respect of slipped back habitations. The Chief Minister pointed out that in most of the habitations, presence of different kinds of impurities has been reported in the water sources like ponds, springs, streams etc which often make the water unfit for human consumption. He directed the Department to conduct regular water analysis to monitor the quality of water to ensure availability of good quality of drinking water.

**Action Point:**

- (a) The Department is required to conduct regular water analysis programmes for monitoring so as to ensure good quality of water supplied.

7. **Sanitation Programme:** The performance of this Programme in respect of construction of individual household latrines was quite satisfactory but needs more effort for its improvement in future.

8. **Immunization** – During 2009-2010 the Department has been able to make considerable achievement in respects of routine immunization and Pulse Polio immunization. The Department also informed that for the year 2009-2010 no target has been fixed. Replying to the Chief Minister's query on whether achievement is based on GoI given target, the Director of Health Services informed that the Department is having its own target on Immunization and that the achievement is almost 80%. The Chief Minister directed the Department to take extra precaution during immunization since any untoward incident (as had happened in the recent past) will discourage the people from taking part in the Programme and thereby, the whole effort of the Government will get derailed. Further, he said that not all PHCs are having generators and vaccines will get spoiled if there is any power failure in the

area. The Department should provide generators to all PHCs in the State for storage of vaccines, etc. As for the number of Institutional delivery in the State, the Department informed that it does not possess any data on the total number of births in a year as majority of people in rural areas preferred home delivery. The Chief Minister stated that as one of the objectives of NRHM is to increase the number of Institutional Deliveries; the Department should make all out effort to collect the data through ASHAs and by comparing with the previous year figures, the progress of achievement for the current year will be known. Field staff should be able to motivate people in this respect. He directed the Department to instruct all District heads to put serious efforts in this regard.

Shri B.M. Lanong, Dy. Chief Minister stated that with the presence of private ambulances and introduction of 108 services in the State, motivating people to go for institutional deliveries should not pose any problem for the Department.

**Action Points:**

(a) The Department should ensure proper storage of vaccines in all CHCs and PHCs keeping in view cases of power disruption during Immunization Programmes.

(b) All Districts should collect data on the number of births in a year and that comparison of the number of institutional delivery during the last 5 years is to be done indicating the changes in percentage terms.

((c) Medical waste disposal in a safe and a scientific manner should be carried out.

**9. ICDS & functional Anganwadi** - The Chief Minister, pointed out that a convergence approach is needed between the Departments of Social Welfare, Health and Education in order to make the Programme successful. Shri R.V. Lyngdoh, MLA, went on to stress on the fact that, in order to have a good nutrition for the Children, convergence with Health Department should be done and this can be carried out on every Village Nutrition Day Programme in all villages. In this respect, both Social Welfare and Health Departments should conduct a study on the nutritional calories under ICDS programme. Further, Food inspection is to be carried out on random basis.

**Action Points:**

(a) Convergence activities between Social Welfare and Health Department should be done so as to determine the types of nutrition as well as for monitoring the health status of the children.

(b) The Department may involve some reputed NGOS for conducting random sample analysis in connection with food being supplied by Angawadies Centres and the report be submitted to the Department for necessary improvements.

**10. Slum Improvement** – The Principal Secretary, Urban Affairs Department informed that, Urban poor families Assisted under Seven Point Charter includes, Land Tenure, Affordable Housing for Urban Poor, Water Supply & Sanitation (include community Toilet facilities), Housing, Health (to set up Dispensary), Education and Social Security and Social Security. Over the years, the scheme had been playing a significant role in providing basic amenities like drinking water supply, sanitation facilities, street lights, water drains, footpaths, jeepable roads etc., in the slum areas of the State.

**11. PMGSY** -The road connectivity works have picked up quite a bit since last year and have shown good performance i.e 90 % during 2009-10. The Department informed that out of the target of 400 habitations, 354 habitations have been covered which was sanctioned till Phase – V. It was also informed that works under Phase-V was started last year only in Mawlai area. As for Phase VI, the Department is examining the possibility of availing fund from the World Bank.

The Chief Minister regretted to note that, at the National level, the State is lagging far behind when compared with the other States which have reached up to Phase IX, thus Meghalaya is behind schedule by four Phases in the implementation of PMGSY. He therefore wondered as to how we can make up for the lost time and catch up with the other States. PWD is, therefore, required to come up with innovative ideas in order to keep pace with others States and the Chief Minister urged upon the Department to try to complete all schemes by March 2011, if fund is available. The Department informed that Phase VI proposals have already been submitted to the Ministry, but the same were put on hold and are yet to be cleared by the Ministry. As for Phase VII proposals, the process of engagement of PIC was finalized and award of work to the Consultant was done, but NRRDA, has now asked for the same to be reviewed pending finalization of revised programme targets. The Chief Minister was of the view that, if the same was not approved by the Ministry, there could have been some deficiencies or loopholes somewhere. In this regard, the Chief Minister, instructed the Department to rectify the deficiencies and not to be content with just saying that the same was not approved by the Central Ministry. In case of blacktopping of road, the Deputy Chief Minister suggested that Department need not wait for 5 years for blacktopping of road but this can be done within every 3 years.

**Action Points:**

- (a) The Department is required to come up with innovative ideas so as to keep pace with other States of the Country
- (b) The Department should try to complete all the sanctioned schemes by March 2011, if fund is available.

(c) In case of blacktopping of road, the Department need not wait for 5 years for blacktopping of road but this can be done after 3 years.

(d) PWD is required to look into the loopholes/deficiencies in respect of proposals/estimates which have been submitted but put on hold and are yet to be cleared by the MoRD.

(e) On maintenance of PMGSY roads, the Department should clearly specify and earmark the fund required.

**12. Afforestation (Public and Forest Land)** - The Forest Department achievements on Area covered under plantation and seedlings planted have been graded as poor in the report. Clarifying the point, the Principal Chief Conservator of Forest informed that the Department has implemented only 49% of the target on seedling planted and the rest is being implemented by Soil & Water Conservation Department. This is a Joint Forest Management Scheme and if information from Soil & Water Conservation Dept. is obtained then percentage of achievement would have been around 70%. He also admitted that proper monitoring have not been taken by the Department in an effective manner. In this regard, Chief Minister instructed that monitoring needs to be carried out in an effective manner and the people/ villagers needs to be sensitized as well. With regards to low percentage of area covered under Plantation, Shri R.V. Lyngdoh was of the view that the same can be tied up with the District Councils and the Syiemship so as to cover depleting forest land under Joint Forest Management Programme and thus achieve the desired result. In this regard, the Chief Minister suggested adopting of villages in the Joint Forest Management Programme and to focus on/ address the issue of de-forestation. Further, he advised to examine the possibility of enactment of law to declare certain areas as eco- sensitive areas to protect and preserve the forest land. Deputy Chief Minister was of the view that retaining of greenery is the obligation of the State and therefore, Govt. should check illegal felling of trees.

**Action Points:**

(a) The Department should improve the monitoring mechanism and the people/ villagers needs to be sensitized.

(b) The Department should examine the possibility of identifying key areas and adopting villages for taking up plantation in the Joint Forest Management Programme and to focus on/ address the issue of de-forestation.

(c) Department to examine the possibility of enactment of law to declare certain areas as eco-sensitive areas to protect the forest.

(d) Illegal felling of trees should be checked by the Department.

(e) Something has to be done to check burning of charcoal in West Khasi Hills.

**13. RGGVY** – The Addl. Chief Secretary, Power informed that at least 10 % of the Household have been connected and hope that by 2011-12 all BPL household will be covered. Shri R.V.Lyngdoh informed that power connection to Water Supply Schemes was not given even after payment of fees and that water pumps have all dried out. In this respect, Chief Minister instructed MECL to give connection to those projects where payment has already been deposited. He further directed that complete monitoring should be there and that D.Cs and MECL to have co-ordination in the process of implementation of all power projects. The Chief Minister also suggested that inauguration of completed projects should be made to make the people aware of the scheme.

**Action Points:**

- (a) MeECL should immediately provide power connection to all those Water Supply Projects where payment has already been deposited.
- (b) All Deputy Commissioners and MeECL should have a joint co-ordination in the process of implementation of all power projects.
- (c) Completed RGGVY projects in different Districts should be inaugurated so as to make the people aware of the Scheme.

**14. Irrigation** – The issue of energizing diesel pump sets was discussed. Intervening in the discussion, the Chief Minister stated that only in Meghalaya, electricity has not been utilised to supplement power to diesel pumps for farming activities. The Diesel pumps which have been supplied to the farmer are very heavy and need 3 to 4 people to lift them at the time of shifting from one place to another, which is practically impossible when women are involved. The Chief Minister desired that the latest varieties of pump sets be procured to replace the old Diesel pumps.

**Action Point:**

The Department should find out ways and means to look into the possibility of introducing new/updated varieties of pump sets.

**Action points for all Departments concerned with TPP:**

- 1. Performances of TPP should be regularly monitored by Senior Officers at different levels. They should be responsible and accountable for effective implementation of the scheme.
- 2. There should be regular and timely submission of progress report by the implementing Departments as this affects the all India ranking of the State in TPP.
- 3. With so much fund having been pumped into the State for implementation of TPP, there should be effective utilization of funds at all levels
- 4. Monitoring Committees on TPP constituted at the District and Block levels are to conduct regular review meetings at their levels. (Action- Deputy Commissioners and BDOs)

15. In a brief presentation on the Online Monitoring on TPP, Shri W.L. Buam, System Engineer, State Computer Cell informed the Meeting that the data on TPP is available in the Departmental Website for viewing, which also may be printed by interested stakeholders including members of the public. He also informed that process of designing and developing of online applications which would include data pertaining to TPP and for effectively monitoring the implementation of developmental Programmes in the State has been taken up by the Department.

Concluding the Meeting, the Chief Minister, expressed his satisfaction that the deliberations were fruitful and meaningful. He impressed upon all the implementing Departments the need to be frank enough to identify the problems and deficiencies in the implementation of TPP so that they would be able to come up with solutions. He said that TPP is linked to the basic objective of fighting against poverty and creating better avenues for the common man. Therefore our approach should be in such a way that we basically live up to the expectation of the common man. He further said that the TPP was conceptualized keeping the basic needs of the common people in mind, and therefore our commitment should be to ensure that that each point is implemented in the spirit of alleviation of abject poverty by providing better opportunities for the people and for the upliftment of the standard of living of the poor. If this could be achieved, then half of the problems currently faced by the state would be solved.

The Meeting ended with a vote of thanks to the chair.
